"I had quite a trip," the author told his friend Philip Percival, with characteristic understatement. *Green Hills of Africa* is Hemingway's account of that expedition, of what it taught him about Africa and himself. Richly evocative of the region's natural beauty, tremendously alive to its character, culture, and customs, and pregnant with a hard-won wisdom gained from the extraordinary situations it describes, it is widely held to be one of the twentieth century's classic travelogues.

Told in his trademark subdued, stripped-down writing style, *Green Hills of Africa* recounts American writer Ernest Hemingway's December 1933 big-game safari in East Africa. Originally published in serial format in Scribner's Magazine, *Green Hills of Africa* was released in 1935 to lukewarm critical reception, however, in the years since its original publication, the book has come to represent some of the best of Hemingway's travel writing and an era long since passed.
