

Science Comparative Education Noah Harold Eckstein

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Dr. Noah ' s monumentally influential 1969 book, *Toward a Science of Comparative Education*, coauthored with his frequent collaborator, Max Eckstein (they met as TC doctoral students), helped to shift the field toward quantitative methodologies drawn from political science, economics and sociology that could be used to explain and predict phenomena rather than simply describe them. Dr. Noah also pioneered the use of cross-national comparisons among multiple nations.
