Supporting your child through your separation. Every child reacts in their own way when their parents separate. Whatever their response when family life changes, support is out there. Every child and young person's experience with the loss of their known family unit will be unique, but it can sometimes cause intense emotional distress. In the immediacy of a break up, children's early response can involve a number of defense behaviours, including: denial, disbelief, dissociation, hyperactivity, irritability and protest, alarm and panic.
